A manufacturer let agents write to ERP and MES without loosening a single permission

The integration fabric verified every proposed write against the plant's own state before it committed — and refused 4.9% of them.

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Summary

An industrial manufacturer wanted maintenance and production-planning agents to write directly into ERP and MES. Orcher sat in the write path, checked each proposal against live plant state and standing work rules, and produced a record for each committed change.

4.9% of proposed writes refused on contradiction with plant state	0 unscheduled downtime events attributed to agent writes	63% reduction in planner re-entry time	31 plants live on the same enforced write path
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The situation

- Agents could read plant data but not write, so every recommendation still needed manual re-entry.
- Manual re-entry introduced its own error rate and erased most of the time saved.
- Plant IT would not grant write access to a system that could not explain a change after the fact.

What Orcher enforced

- Every proposed write was verified against live MES state, standing work rules and maintenance windows before commit.
- Role Identity Fabric derived agent write scope from the planner or maintenance lead who issued the directive.
- Contradictions produced refusals with the specific conflicting state attached, routed back to the human.
- Observability gave each plant a local view of what agents had changed in its own systems that shift.

The data

One quarter of agent write traffic across 31 plants.

Outcomes

- Plant IT extended write access to two further agent classes on the strength of the refusal record.
- Planners spend their time on the refusals, which are the genuinely interesting cases.
- Refusal causes fed back into work-rule cleanup, retiring 140 stale rules.
- The manufacturer standardised the enforced write path for all future automation projects.

“Write access was never a technical question for us. It was a question of what happens the first time the system is confidently wrong.”
